



2. Historical Development: (with dates and small sketch plan).

The building appears to have been an aisleless church dating from about 1200 to 1220 (with Nave, Chancel & West Tower of S. Trich), to which Aisles were added c. 1230. Windows have been inserted at different periods; in the 14th century the East wall & part of the N. wall of the Chancel were rebuilt & the top of the tower reconstructed. In the 15th century the building without being altered to any great extent in plan appears to have undergone a certain amount of reconstruction notably in the E. walls of the Nave & Aisles: the chancel arch was thrown its jamb cut back, and the East walls of both aisles were ^{probably} ~~been~~ thriven in the upper half of each wall. ^{original location of N.W. window}

4. Architectural description, from East to West: (with dates and measurements).

Chancel (26 ft by 13 ft) East window of three trefoiled ogee headed lights and quatrefoiled & tracery in two-centred head with moulded label: spayed jamb & arch moulds, and chamfered research: c. 1330. East wall a 14th c. rebuilding with part of N. wall. North two lancet windows one near east end, the other near west end: Both early 13th cent. Below the latter a blocked low-side window (square) and East of it a recess which was probably a ~~lancet~~ ^{recess} window: The lancets have spayed almost circular heads inside.

South wall three windows: First of two trefoiled ogee headed lights under a square head with moulded jamb and label all of a very dark brown lime stone: dates from c. 1360. Second a 13th c. lancet like the others: Third window a 13th cent. cinquefoiled single light with four-centred arch in square head: sunk spandrels; has a modern transom, below which the stone is modern outside except one stone in E. jamb: above the transom window is old: inside, the existing window edge is placed above the old one which is set low in wall. Between the 2nd & 3rd windows a 13th c. doorway with pointed arch & semicircular research. Both N & S. walls have 13th cent. string courses outside: one below the sill-level plinths; a triforium for the low-sides. The other at the springing level of the clerestory heads above which it is carried to form labels.

Chancel arch of early 13th c. date, rebuilt and altered at a later period probably in the 15th century: the arch is two-centred and retains two of the moulded orders & label, on the west side: it has been much thriven on the East side back from the original E. face of the jamb: the jambs have chamfered edges with moulded abaci and in the middle an attached circular shaft: both shafts have modern bases: The North capital ~~base~~ is carved with an enriched scalloped ornament and the S. capital has an early form of foliate the S. joint has been nearly half cut away on its East side and a moulded corbel put in to carry the overhanging arch.

Nave, (41 ft by 13 ft) has N. & S. arcades of three bays: both are probably of early 13th century origin but the caps all differ slightly in detail some probably the result of later recutting: one inch the S.E. bears signs of having been rebuilt



Altar slab a stone found in the floor at the East end of the N. Aisle has been placed on the 17th c. communion table in the Chancel as the former altar slab: it has been redressed.

Bells three P^t has a number of meaningless letters & quo: date & maker uncertain: 2. by Chandler 1716 3rd Eliz Knight 1723 : small sanctus of 1847.

Brackets for images two plain bracketed flanking E. window of chancel: chamfered; semi-octagonal

Communion table: 1⁷ c. with turned legs: in chancel

Door outer door: inch plan set 17th c. date.


Galler modern one at W. end said to be a globoles: the front made up of some 17th c. panelling.

Niches At E. end of S. aisle (S. of Ewouds) a trefoiled niche with chantered sills: it has chantered stops one is lower than the other now, but before the restoration the wall is said to have sunk to the south but the stops were level with each other showing that the settlement took place before the niche was put in ^{which was} probably in the 15th century.

Paintings traces of red paint on the chancel arch, & on the Ewouds

Piscinae 1. In chancel: circular basin on pointed corbel sill  apparent section but much penituted head is robust

2. In E. end of N. arcade (Nave side) is a 15th c. weathered piscina w/ a multi-flashed fascia: pointed arch cut in the respond.

3. In the L. aisle a round headed piscina: half the circular basin ^{broken away} & drain holes on face. 13th c.




Seating a number of plain panelled seats in Nave probably late 16th c.

Stoops E. of J. doorway in S. aisle a trefoiled head of recess: half of it is old rail to have been found in its present position with part of the plastered round back of recess: all a modern copy of the chancel piscina: set very low in the wall.

Miscellanies Three stones in chancel were found in the wall apparently belonged to the original bell chamber window: one has been used twice from originally part of a trefoiled head: another was a foliage cap of a shaft.

Small holes cut in the E. respond of N. arcade for former wood rails of screen (see sketch)



of the small locker W. of pt. ~~now~~ now placed in the space formerly occupied by the remainder of the pamb Sh. so that the alteration took place probably in the 15th century.

The S. porch was added probably in the 15th century & reconstructed in the 16th century or early 17th century.

A restoration took place in 1875, but little was done as the church in 1900 was in very bad condition and the building was put into thorough repair in 1906 under the present Rector who states that the S. wall of the chancel was rebuilt from its foundations. The N.W. window of the chancel was removed from its original position (further East) to make room for the large Monument which was then in the North Aisle; that the windows in the N. Aisle formerly hidden by the monument were opened out; that the head of the lancet at the W. end of the S. Aisle was found buried in the S. wall & adopted to its present position & other stonework was restored; the present W. gallery was put in, evidence of a former one having been found; the seats (formerly box pews) were modernized & the pulpit (formerly a "three decker") was re-constructed. He also states that the arcades were found to have no bond with the earlier East & West walls of the Nave.

Architectural Description (continued)

The responds are semicircular

The pillars circular: the bases

are simple mostly with square plinths

but the base of the 2nd S. pillar is more elaborate & all circular.

The capitals are well offant,

simple form the P.T.O. cap & the

2nd N. cap ~~app~~ have been recut.

The 3rd S. cap is a much more

elaborate one than the rest having

a moulded abacus, and a bell swivelled with a very early form of foliage.

The arches are of two chamfered orders (with small voussoirs) and have plain round labels meeting together over the S. pillars but having

stops over the N. pillars, that is the P.T.O. pillar being a very long leaf head

and the other a break head (rose) and a rising over it. Vertical joints over

each pillar suggest that the arches are built up separately.

No clearstory but a modern tower window on the S. side at the W. end.



The badge masonry is made up of 13thc. string course and has on its upper surface some square scratchings or incised lines of no apparent significance: the lintel inside is of modern oak. The jambs and mullions are moulded: the spandrels in the head between the lights appear to have been subsequently enlarged but the window otherwise appears to be an early example of a square headed window & dates probably from the middle of the 14th century c 1360. The second window is a tiny lancet of early 13thc. date with rebated & splayed outer jambs and widely splayed inner jambs; the rear arch inside is a trefoiled one with sunk spandrels containing a circular flower; it is obviously a bad fit on the splayed jambs and is probably of early 16thc. date. The third window is close to the second but much higher in the wall; this is of similar section outside but has a round head: it is probably contemporary with the other & both belonged probably to the original Nave; their present positions could be more easily explained if the charity chapels which probably existed here could be re-constructed. The N. doorway, close to the 3rd window, has plain chamfered jambs and a ~~modern~~ semi-circular arch probably of early 13th century date. The fourth window is of two lancet lights: the jambs are like the others in section and are probably of early 13thc. date, but the two arches are irregularly cut all out of one stone which has a horizontal rebate inside suggesting that the heads & the mullion are all of later date probably 16th century: the sill is made up of 13thc. string course and the inner lintel is of oak. The west window is of two lights & appears to be another 16thc. adoption of 13thc. work: the heads of the lights are almost round & splayed and are in one piece of stone: inside, it has a wooden lintel as the other windows.




South Arch: Eastern part is a 13thc. arch with ~~rebated~~ ^{plain label} & a corbel (probably reused) in the apex. The Western part is a half mullion. South wall: two windows: 1st in the Eastern half is of four plain square headed lights with a moulded label outside & wood lintel inside. 2nd in W. half is a modern copy of the 1st N. window in N. Aisle. The South doorway is contemporary with the Chancel arch & belonged to the original aisleless church; it was set into the wall in which it was probably the outer or South wall of the original S. porch to the face of which the present South aisle was built, the side walls of the porch being removed. The jambs are of two orders the inner with an edge roll, the outer chamfered, with a detached shaft in the angle between the two orders both shafts have moulded bases, and intermediate bands: the E. cap is a square moulded one & is probably a later one than the W. one which has a carved foliage, much perished & a moulded abacus. The inner order of the arch is ~~concentric~~ ^{concentric}, continuing the roll from the jamb, and is of 15th cent. date when the doorway appears to have been re-modelled: the main order is moulded and forms a high ^{pointed} segmental arch without a label: it has also been rebuilt probably in the 15thc. Over the doorway are two pieces of weathering belonging to the original porch. A 13thc. string course below the windows inside.



West wall. Small lancet window with 13thc. head & Norman jamb to all the head was found buried in the S. wall & was put in its present position: over it a small quatrefoil light probably 13thc.

West Tower (10½ ft sq.) of two stages with a saddleback tiled roof:

The archway from the Nave has chamfered square jamb with very small central shafts (detached): the N. shaft has moulded base and ~~the S. shaft~~ ^{N.} the S. shaft has a later length of octagonal shaft: the N. cap ogee-shaped carved with a form of scallop ornament, & mould abacus: the S. cap has a ^{other} more elaborate form of incipient leaf. 

The arch is two-centred of two chamfered orders & has a plain round label on the E. side

The W. window is a 13thc. lancet with a small round label on splay: the

jamb & head mowrie are splayed. The upper story of the lower stage has a round headed ^{single light} window on the N. side, & similar blocked lights in the W. & S. walls; in the E. wall was a doorway into the roof space, now reduced to a modern loop. 

The bell-chamber - a second stage - has the original 13thc. windows on the N. side, of two trefoiled lights with tympana over within high lancet pointed outer orders with labels. On the N. E. & S. walls are 14thc. windows of two trefoiled

ogee-headed lights with a quatrefoil over, in a two-centred head

with a moulded label having masks tops. The E. window of one

chamfered order, the two side windows of two. In the E. wall is a

vertical straight joint with an edge roll showing the position of the

13thc. (former) window in the S. half of the wall: in the S. wall is

a shorter length of similar roll mould showing that the

side walls had similar double ~~double~~ windows and that the

side walls were originally as high as the E. & W. walls.

The E. & W. walls are gabled, the former flanked above the window,



finial of a canopy: it has no connection with any other detail near it.

The inner & plastered joints remain, no evidence of them being visible outside. On either side of the E. window is a small square hole c 4/6 deep of no apparent use unless they were putlog holes. The outer archway of the porch has an old two-centred high segmental arch ~~if~~ with an edge roll mould: it is not impossible that this was the original inner arch of the S. doorway & was moved out to its present place when the inner arch of the S. doorway was remodelled in the 15thc.: it has one modern stone but the joints are all modern: Inside is a wood frame probably of the 17thc. from an old door. Wall over doorway has low pitched gablet coping of 15thc. and over that a higher pitched modern gable in which is set a small cross with a cross cut in it.



Nave: has four old tie beams clamped: date uncertain: mortised under the Western most tie on the N. side is a moulded corbel ^{on a stone corbel} post probably put in in the 17th c. to strengthen the end of the tie. Remains of mortar.

Asles modern lean to roof covered with lead

Porch has two tiebeams of late 15thC. or early 16thC. date: the S. tie is moulded & has a Tudor rose boss in centre: the N. tie is modern with an old boss re-set: this carved as a face (? a lion): moulded cornice: the queen post trusses above these ties have been cut away & the higher pitched roof is of modern date.

Floors modern stone flags & squares. From the height of the S. door, where holy water stoup, E. of same, Piscina in chancel, plinth of cover to. The original floor must have been much lower than at present but the bases of the arcades & the g. aisle piscina show that the floor was raised at a fairly early date to its present level.

In lancet window of N. aisle small squares set diamond wise with quatrefoils and cross hatched ground in brown; 14th cent.

In chancel on N. large architectural monument with high plinth with pedestalled cornithian order superimposed upon Ionic order both with complete entablatures, lower mitred back upper enriched and overhanging; between lower columns is panel with ~~the~~ of four sons and five daughters above ~~are~~ effigies of father and mother ~~and~~ suscribed panel with strap work framed and grotesque frame, ~~the~~ panel inscribed to Thomas Tipping Esquier, 1598, and his wife Margaret; above is a shield with a bend engrailed three pheons thereon quartering two cheverons sable. The initials T. T. M. appear on the Ionic frieze. Whole monument of crude design and workmanship. In S. aisle, mural, to Thomas Phillips, 1704, and Mary, his wife, 1681; arms: azure a leopard rampant argent a chief ermee impaling a fesse gules between three eagles displayed sable. In chancel at S. W. on floor, slab to Edmund Lawrence 1645; at W end nave on floor, slab to "Mrs Ann Coles wife of Thomas Coles of this parish" 1695.
